Thinking Skills and Personal Capabilities

Thinking Skills and Personal Capabilities have been divided into five strands:

- Managing Information;
- Thinking, Problem-Solving and Decision-Making;
- Being Creative;
- Working with Others; and
- Self-Management.

These skills underpin the curriculum, along with the Cross-Curricular Skills of Communication, Using Mathematics and Using ICT.

The curriculum emphasises the development of pupils' skills and capabilities for lifelong learning and participating in society. By engaging pupils in active learning contexts across all areas of the curriculum, we can develop pupils':

- personal and interpersonal skills;
- capabilities and dispositions; and
- ability to think both creatively and critically.

Activity Based Learning provides a medium through which the pupils will have opportunities to develop these skills in a practical, hands-on experience.

In school, pupils are guided through tasks to examine how to approach, structure and work through activities. They will solve any problems which may arise, including differences of opinion. We give the pupils opportunities to self and peer assess in order to see how they can improve their learning.

Mathematics and Numeracy

Processes

Making and Monitoring Decisions

- Plan and organise work

Communicating Mathematically

- Understand and use mathematical language to explain and discuss their work
- Compare ideas and methods of working

Mathematical Reasoning

• Recognise patterns and relationships and make predictions.

Number

- Count, read, write and order whole numbers, initially to 10, progressing to at least 100
- Understand that the place of the digit indicates its value
- Make a sensible estimate of a small number of objects and begin to approximate to the nearest 10
- Recognise and use simple everyday fractions

Patterns, Relationships and Sequences in Number

- Copy, continue and devise repeating patterns
- Understand the use of a symbol to stand for an unknown number

Operations and their Applications

- Understand the operations of addition, subtraction and use them to solve problems;
- Know addition and subtraction facts to
- Develop strategies for adding and subtracting mentally up to the addition of two two-digit numbers within 100

Money

- Recognise coins and use them in simple contexts;
- Talk about the value of money and ways in which it could be spent, saved and kept safe

Measures

- Understand and use the language associated with length, 'weight', capacity, area and time
- Use non-standard units to measure and recognise the need for standard units
- Know and use the most commonly used units to measure in purposeful contexts
- Choose and use simple measuring instruments, reading and interpreting them with reasonable accuracy
- Sequence everyday events; know the days of the week, months of the year and seasons
- Recognise times on the analogue clock and digital displays

Shape and Space

- sort 2-D and 3-D shapes in different ways
- make constructions, pictures and patterns using 2-D and 3-D shapes
- name and describe 2-D and 3-D shapes
- recognise reflective symmetry;

Position, Movement and Direction


- Use prepositions to state position
- Half and full turn

Handling Data

- Sort and classify objects for one or two criteria and represent results using Venn and Carroll diagram
- Collect data, record and present it using real objects, drawings
- Discuss and interpret the data
- Extract information from a range of charts, diagrams and tables

Problem Solving

- An important part of Numeracy is equipping children with the strategies they need to solve problems.
- We are looking at a number of approaches including bar modelling.
- Using the bar modelling method, the children draw rectangles to represent objects



Language and Literacy

Requirements are:

Talking and Listening

In a range of contexts, with different audiences and taking account of a variety of purposes;

- Listen attentively
- Ask questions about others' points of view and respond appropriately
- Explain ideas and opinions clearly
- Gain confidence in addressing audience

Pupils will:

- Report back from Activity Based Learning
- Participate in class and small group discussions

- Participate in Show and Tell
- Assume various roles during Activity Based Learning

Reading

In a range of contexts, with different audiences and taking account of a variety of purposes:

- Read a range of texts
- Read independently
- Locate information and use it appropriately Research
- Understand explicit and implicit meanings
- Explain opinions.

Pupils will:



Using ICT

Using ICT (Information and Communications Technology) describes the ability to handle and communicate information, solve problems, pose questions and be creative through the use of technology.

The focus on Using ICT means that pupils will have opportunities to transfer their knowledge, understanding and skills in a variety of meaningful contexts across the curriculum. This includes:

- collaborating inside and outside the classroom;
- sharing and exchanging work; and
- exhibiting and showcasing their learning.

Music

Pupils' experiences in Music centre around three core activities: composing, performing and listening.

The pupils will;

- Follow 'The Music Express,' Programme,
- Learn songs and hymns from the Religion Programme including First Confession songs.
- Explore and experiment with instruments and sound using a range of tuned and un-tuned instruments.

Art and Design

Art and Design activities encourage the pupils to:

- respond to the world around them

- develop and use their imagination
- express their ideas, thoughts and feelings
- solve problems
- become more aesthetically aware

The pupils will:

- Complete WAU related Art work
- Use wide range of art materials
- Appreciate the work of a famous artist
- Complete seasonal art activities

Drama

Drama enables pupils to express their thoughts, ideas and feelings in a safe environment.

The pupils will:

- Assume various roles within Activity Based Learning and productions
- Take part in teacher lead activities, including PDMU lessons

Personal Development and Mutual Understanding

Personal Development and Mutual Understanding (PDMU) focuses on encouraging each child to become personally, emotionally and socially effective, to lead healthy, safe and fulfilled lives and to become confident, independent and responsible citizens, making informed and responsible choices and decisions throughout their lives.

Children will:

- Have an opportunity to undertake various class responsibilities Take part in Anti Bullying week
- Participate in Circle Time
- Create and modify our Class Plan for Learning

PDMU is a subject in which pupils can reflect on their choices and set themselves targets and challenges. We aim to set up our annual School Council and will continue to foster positive behaviour through our Class Plans for Learning, high expectations and consistent use of our positive behaviour Policy.

Physical Education

Physical Education in the curriculum provides the opportunity for specific attention to be given to the physical development, health and well-being of children.

The pupils will complete activities in:

- Gymnastics
- Dance
- Games
- Athletics

Children are asked to attend school on PE days already dressed in PE uniform and will remain in this clothing throughout the day.

Assessment for Learning

St. Mary's on the Hill embraces the principles of Assessment for Learning by placing formative assessment at the heart of the learning and teaching cycle. The emphasis is on improvement, raising achievement in pupils' learning and celebrating success. Assessment for Learning has the potential to make a powerful contribution to the central aim of the Northern Ireland curriculum by empowering learners and enabling them to realise their full potential.

Allergies

Please remember that St. Mary's on the Hill is a NUT FREE ZONE.

Due to severe allergies among some of our pupils, birthday cakes and other sharing treats are not permitted.

Please advise the class teacher of any changes in your child's medical needs.

Medication

Should your child require essential medication during the school day, a consent form (available from the school office) must be completed and left at the school office along with the medication.

Please ensure that medicines in school, such as inhalers and adrenalin pens are in date.

Medical & Dental Appointments

If your child has an appointment, please contact your child's teacher to let them know. Your child can be collected from the school office where they will be signed out.

Uniform

Full school uniform should be worn, except on PE days, when PE gear should be worn to school. In addition, pupils participating in after-school sports activities can wear our school PE uniform.

Our PE gear consists of plain navy tracksuit bottoms or shorts, a plain white polo shirt and dark trainers.

The only jewellery permitted is a watch and a small pair of stud earnings.
