## **Thinking Skills and Personal Capabilities**

Thinking Skills and Personal Capabilities have been divided into five strands:

- Managing Information
- Thinking, Problem-Solving and Decision-Making
- Being Creative
- Working with Others
- Self-Management

These skills underpin the curriculum, along with the Cross-Curricular Skills of Communication, Using Mathematics and Using ICT.

The curriculum emphasises the development of pupils' skills and capabilities for lifelong learning and participating in society. By engaging pupils in active learning contexts across all areas of the curriculum, we can develop pupils':

- Personal and interpersonal skills
- Capabilities and dispositions
- Ability to think both creatively and critically

In school, pupils are guided through tasks to examine how to approach, structure and work through activities. They will solve any problems which may arise, including differences of opinion. We give the pupils opportunities to self and peer assess in order to see how they can improve their learning.

## **Mathematics and Numeracy**

Requirements are:

- Processes in Maths
- Numbers
- Measures
- Shape and Space
- Handling Data

## **Process in Mathematics**

- Making and monitoring decisions
- Communicating mathematically
- Mathematical reasoning

## Number

- count, read, write and order whole numbers
- develop an understanding of place value
- estimate and approximate
- explore and predict patterns and sequences
- develop strategies to add and subtract mentally
- know the multiplication facts
- engage in a range of activities to develop understanding of the four operations of number
- use the four operations to solve problems involving money
- discuss the value of money

## Measures

- develop skills in estimation of length, 'weight', volume/capacity, time, area and temperature
- understand the relationship between units and convert one metric unit to another
- use the four operations to solve problems
- recognise times on the analogue and digital clocks

## Shape and Space


- construct a range of regular and irregular 2-D shapes
- name and describe common 2-D shapes
- construct 3-D shapes
- investigate the number of faces, edges and vertices on these shapes
- name and describe common 3-D shapes
- understand the notion of angle in the context of turning
- recognise right angles
- develop language associated with line and angle

## **Data Handling**

• collect, classify, record and present data drawn from a range of meaningful situations, using graphs, tables, diagrams and ICT software

### **Problem Solving**

- An important part of Numeracy is equipping children with the strategies they need to solve problems
- We are looking at a number of approaches including **bar modelling**.

## Language and Literacy

Requirements are;

- Talking and Listening
- Reading
- Writing

## **Talking and Listening**

In a range of contexts, with different audiences and taking account of a variety of purposes, **the pupils will;** 

- Listen attentively
- Ask questions about others' points of view and respond appropriately
- Explain ideas and opinions clearly
- Plan an approach to talking
- Participate in PDMU lessons
- Be involved in assemblies and Class Council meetings.
- Complete Circle Time activities
- Discuss and debate elements of the Thinking Skills and Personal Capabilities Programme

## Reading

In a range of contexts, with different audiences and taking account of a variety of purposes, **the pupils will;** 

- Read a range of texts
- Read independently
- Locate information and use it appropriately Research
- Understand explicit and implicit meanings
- Explain opinions
- Complete shared reading activities through a range of Big Book resources,
- Complete guided reading activities through the group novel work and related task board activities
- Complete comprehension tasks

- Use Accelerated Reader
- Identify and use the explicit skills of reading as set out in our VIPERS strategy

Pupils will be encouraged to read widely; fiction, non-fiction, comics, magazines, sports reports... anything that sparks an interest! We are very lucky to be an Accelerated Reading school, and we would encourage you to monitor your child's achievements by signing up to Home Connect.

### Writing

In a range of contexts, with different audiences and taking account of a variety of purposes, **the pupils will;** 

- Talk about, plan and edit work
- Structure writing
- Consider the purpose of writing and choose the appropriate form; Instructional, Persuasive, Report, Recount, Explanation, Narrative or Discursive.

### Handwriting

The children will complete regular handwriting practice, following our scheme, *Penpals for Handwriting.* 

## **Using ICT**

Using ICT (Information and Communications Technology) includes the ability to handle and communicate information, solve problems, pose questions and be creative through the use of technology.

The focus on Using ICT means that pupils will have opportunities to transfer their knowledge, understanding and skills in a variety of meaningful contexts across the curriculum. This includes:


- collaborating inside and outside the classroom
- sharing and exchanging work
- exhibiting and showcasing their learning

Using ICT, along with Communication and Using Mathematics, is one of the three statutory Cross-Curricular Skills that form part of the Northern Ireland Curriculum.

The five areas which the children learn through are:

- Express
- Exchange
- Evaluate
- Explore
- Exhibit

## The Arts

## Music

Pupils' experiences in music centre around three core activities: composing, performing and listening.

## The pupils will;

- Follow the 'Music Express' Programme
- Learn songs and hymns through the Religion Programmes hymns (We will follow guidance from the Department of Education regarding singing)

## Art and Design

Art and Design activities encourage the pupils to:

- Respond to the world around them
- Respond to their individual feelings and emotions
- Develop and use their imagination
- Express their ideas, thoughts and feelings
- Solve problems
- Become more aesthetically aware

## The pupils will;

- Use a wide range of art materials
- Appreciate the work of a famous artist
- Complete topic related art work
- Complete seasonal art activities

## Drama

Drama enables pupils to express their thoughts, ideas and feelings in a safe environment.

## The pupils will;

- Take part in teacher lead activities, including PDMU lessons
- Prepare and take part in class presentations

## **Personal Development and Mutual Understanding**

Personal Development and Mutual Understanding focuses on encouraging each child to become personally, emotionally and socially effective. They are taught how to lead healthy, safe and fulfilled lives and to become confident, independent and responsible citizens, by making informed and responsible choices and decisions throughout their lives.

- Have an opportunity to become ECO Warriors
- Have the opportunity to become Pupil of the Month
- Take part in a programme to select a Class and a School Councillor
- Take part in Anti Bullying week

- Take part in Fire Safety Talks
- Create and modify our Class Plan for Learning
- Nurture in 5 Programme
- Follow Calm Plan approach

## **Physical Education**

Physical Education in the curriculum provides the opportunity for specific attention to be given to the physical development, health and well-being of children.

### The pupils will complete activities in;

- Gymnastics
- Dance
- Games
- Athletics
- We will complete a 'Daily Mile' in so far as is practically possible
- **Swimming** -Swimming lessons are on Wednesday for P6SMC and Thursday for P6GB for the first term.

## **Assessment for Learning**

St. Mary's on the Hill embraces the principles of Assessment for Learning by placing formative assessment at the heart of the learning and teaching cycle. The emphasis is on improvement, raising achievement in pupils' learning and celebrating success. Assessment for Learning has the potential to make a powerful contribution to the central aim of the Northern Ireland curriculum by empowering learners and enabling them to realise their full potential.

### The pupils will;

- Use the terms WALT and WILF
- Use peer assessment
- Have their work marked using, '2 stars and a wish'
- Set personal targets for improvement

Regular, ongoing assessment is conducted by the teacher to inform future planning and assist target setting for individuals and groups of children. Standardised tests in English and Maths are conducted in May.

## The World Around Us

This Area of Learning comprises the subjects of Geography, History and Science and Technology.

We want the children to develop an awareness of themselves and their place in the world, as well as of other places, cultures and the environment.

Our topics this year are;

**Term 1 – Raider or Traders –** *In this topic we spend time examining how and why people moved around the world throughout history up to present day. We spend time exploring the lives of Vikings and their impact on our culture today.* 

**Term 2 – Impact** – Throughout this theme we explore the impact of our actions on the world in which we live. We evaluate the decisions that have been made in the world and look at the consequences of these. We explore life in the Rainforest and what impact we are having on this delicate ecosystem.

**Term 3 – It's a disaster!** – *This theme will explore a range of natural and man-made disasters for e.g. Volcanic eruptions, earthquakes, floods etc. We explore how and why these disasters occur and study the effects of climate change.* 

## Homework

- Homework should take approximately one hour, with extra time for reading.
- At times an activity will be set on Google Classroom each week.
- Please sign all written homework.
- If your child is unable to complete the homework within the time, please sign and send it in.

### Morning Drop Off

Please drop your child off at their designated gate from 8.45am. They will proceed straight to their classroom. Children arriving after 9.00am will be recorded as late and should be brought to the office.

### **Collection Times**

Please collect your child from the P1 playground at: Monday - Thursday: 3.00pm Friday: 2.00pm

In the interests of health and safety, pupils are not permitted to return to the school building once dismissed.

Thank you for supporting our Healthy Eating Policy. Please continue to send a piece of fruit with water or milk for the break-time snack.

### Allergies

Please remember that St. Mary's on the Hill is a NUT FREE ZONE.

Due to severe allergies among some of our pupils, birthday cakes and other sharing treats are not permitted.

Please advise the class teacher of any changes in your child's medical needs.

## **Medication**

Should your child require essential medication during the school day, a consent form (available from the school office) must be completed and left at the school office along with the medication.

Please ensure that medicines in school, such as inhalers or Epipens are in date.

## Medical & Dental Appointments

If your child has an appointment, please contact your child's teacher to let them know. Your child can be collected from the school office where they will be signed out.

## <u>Uniform</u>

Full school uniform should be worn, except on PE days, when PE gear should be worn to school.

Our PE gear consists of **plain navy tracksuit bottoms or shorts**, a **plain white polo shirt** and dark trainers.

The only jewellery permitted is a watch and a small pair of stud earrings.

Simple hair accessories are permitted.

All pupils participating in after-school sports activities must wear our school PE uniform.

### **Contact Details**

Please ensure that your contact details are up to date by informing Mrs Mason in the office of any changes to phone numbers, addresses etc. this can be done by e mail or telephone.

## **Pupil Absence**

Please inform the school if your child is absent by phoning or emailing the school office, or by providing a note upon your child's return to school. There is the option to leave a message on the phone system to inform the school of an absence.

### Personal Belongings

Please ensure that all items of your child's clothing and belongings are clearly labelled with their name and class.

Please check stationery regularly and replenish as and when needed.

### Party Invitations/Cakes

Unfortunately, we are unable to accept birthday cakes and treats as we have several children with severe allergies.

We would ask that party invitations are not distributed in school, as per the school policy, as exclusion from such events can cause offence.

## Walking Home

Written consent must be provided for pupils wishing to walk home from school.

### **Mobile Phones**

Permission for mobile phones must be completed on the Google Form before a pupil can bring a mobile phone to school.

Parent-Teacher Consultations will take place during the week beginning 25<sup>th</sup> November 2024. School will be closed for pupils on Friday 29<sup>th</sup> November 2024 for meetings to take place.
